Te Whatu Ora

The Health System in Aotearoa is entering a period of transformation as we implement the Pae Ora/Healthy Futures vision of a reformed system where people live longer in good health, have improved quality of life, and there is equity between all groups.

We want to build a healthcare system that works collectively and cohesively around a shared set of values and a culture that enables everyone to bring their best to work and feel proud when they go home to their whānau, friends and community. The reforms are expected to achieve five system shifts. These are:

1. The health system will reinforce Te Tiriti principles and obligations
2. All people will be able to access a comprehensive range of support in their local communities to help them stay well
3. Everyone will have equal access to high quality emergency and specialist care when they need it
4. Digital services will provide more people the care they need in their homes and communities
5. Health and care workers will be valued and well-trained for the future health system

Context

Capital, Coast & Hutt Valley district provides hospital and health services in primary, secondary and tertiary healthcare to a total population base of approximately 445,000 citizens.

We are accountable for meeting the needs of and improving health outcomes for all the constituent populations of our district, and the region more broadly. Together we:

- provide secondary and tertiary, medical and surgical hospital services alongside community based health care
- fund local health providers and work collaboratively with the community to create and support multiple health education initiatives and projects within the region
- deliver health services directly as well as contracting external providers
- provide local, sub-regional, regional and national health services as well as community-based health, rehabilitation and support services.

The majority of the district's population live in Wellington and Lower Hutt. The Māori and Pacific populations of Lower Hutt and Wellington are proportionally similar, with the largest Pacific population in the region in Porirua. Kapiti and Upper Hutt have similar numbers of Māori and Pacific people. Most people are enrolled with a GP near their place of residence, so the increasing focus on community-based healthcare is expected to lead to better health outcomes for these population groups. Hutt Hospital provides secondary and some tertiary, medical and surgical hospital services alongside community based health care from its main facility in Lower Hutt City. In addition to funding local health providers and working collaboratively with the community to create and support multiple health education initiatives and projects, Hutt Hospital is the centre for five tertiary regional and sub-regional services - Plastics, Maxillofacial and Burns Services; Rheumatology; Dental Services; Regional Public Health; and Regional (Breast and Cervical) Screening Services.

Wellington Regional Hospital in Newtown is the region's main tertiary hospital with services such as complex specialist and acute procedures, intensive care, cardiac surgery, cancer care, neurosurgery and renal care. The hospital is the key tertiary referral centre for the lower half of the North Island and the upper half of the South Island.

Te Wao Nui, the Child Health Service for the Wellington Region and Central New Zealand based in the new purpose built children's hospital on the Wellington Regional Hospital campus, supports babies to adolescents with medical conditions or who may need paediatric surgery. It provides both hospital and outpatient services.

Women's Health Services provide tertiary level maternity care in Wellington and Hutt Regional Hospitals and a Primary Birthing Unit in Kenepuru. The provision of services from Women's Health encompass community-based primary LMC care and breastfeeding support, and tertiary level obstetrics, gynaecology, and other specialist services.

Kenepuru Community Hospital and Kapiti Health Centre provide secondary and community services based in Porirua and the Kapiti Coast

MHAIDS is the mental health, addictions and intellectual disability service for the Wairarapa District and Capital, Coast & Hutt Valley District, with multiple specialist facilities. Ratonga Rua-o- Porirua is our forensic, rehabilitation and intellectual disability inpatient unit.

Te Tiriti o Waitangi and Māori Health Outcomes

Māori are the indigenous peoples of Aotearoa. We have particular responsibilities and accountabilities through this founding document of Aotearoa. We value Te Tiriti and have adopted the following four goals, developed by the Ministry of Health, each expressed in terms of mana and the principles of:

Mana whakahaere	Effective and appropriate stewardship or kaitiakitanga over the health and disability system. This goes beyond the management of assets or resources.
Mana motuhake	Enabling the right for Māori to be Māori (Māori self-determination); to exercise their authority over their lives, and to live on Māori terms and according to Māori philosophies, values and practices including tikanga Māori.
Mana tāngata	Achieving equity in health and disability outcomes for Māori across the life course and contributing to Māori wellness.
Mana Māori	Enabling Ritenga Māori (Māori customary rituals) which are framed by Te Aō Māori (the Māori world), enacted through tikanga Māori (Māori philosophy & customary practices) and encapsulated within mātauranga Māori (Māori knowledge).

We will target, plan and drive our health services to create equity of health care for Māori to attain good health and well-being, while developing partnerships with the wider social sector to support whole of system change.

Te Mauri o Rongo

Te Mauri o Rongo recognises our connection to this work, to each other, to the people we serve and to our whakapapa. It speaks to specific behaviours that we will expect from each other guided by the pou of Te Mauri o Rongo:

Wairuatanga

Working with heart, the strong sense of purpose and commitment to service that health workers bring to their mahi.

Rangatiratanga

As organisations we support our people to lead. We know our people; we will grow those around us and be accountable with them in contributing to Pae Ora for all.

Whanaungatanga

We are a team, and together a team of teams. Regardless of our role, we work together for a common purpose. We look out for each other and keep each other safe. “Whiria te tangāta” – we will weave our people together.

Te Korowai Āhuru

A cloak which seeks to provide safety and comfort to the workforce.

District Responsibility

The district leadership have collective accountability for leading with integrity and transparency a progressive, high performing organisation, aimed at improving the health and independence of the community we serve and achieving equitable outcomes for all. The leadership team are responsible for achieving this aim, aligned with our Region, within the available resources, through a skilled, empowered, motivated and supported workforce in line with government and HNZ policy.

Te Whatu Ora is committed to Te Tiriti o Waitangi principles of partnership, participation, equity and protection by ensuring that guidelines for employment policies and procedures are implemented in a way that recognises Māori cultural practices.

We are committed to supporting the principles of Equal Employment Opportunities (EEO) through the provision and practice of equal access, consideration, and encouragement in the areas of employment, training, career development and promotion for all its employees.

Unit Perspective

The Workforce and Practice Development Unit (W&PDU) supports the District Chief Nurse and Nurse Directors. The W&PDU's work streams are aligned with the Pae Ora (Healthy Futures) Act in 2022, Government policy statement for 2024-2027 and Health New Zealand (HNZ) | Te Whatu Ora's strategic direction. The W&PDU provides leadership and support for nurses in the pre-registration, postgraduate, professional development and recognition and the graduate entry programmes. This includes the Nurse Entry to Practice and Enrolled Nurse Support into Practice and ongoing learning for staff across the District. Professional development is an important workforce focus across primary, secondary and tertiary services; as is developing, managing and improving processes and systems to optimise workforce contribution and resilience to ensure quality patient outcomes.

The W&PDU team are committed to the principles of Te Tiriti O Waitangi and pro-equity goals. They demonstrate values consistent with Te Mauri o Rongo. The W&PDU supports nursing teams to provide person and whānau centred care using current evidence to assist people to achieve their optimum health. The W&PDU promotes and fosters a culture of education and professional development which will enhance staff skills and capability to provide high quality and safe services.

Role Purpose

The Nurse Coordinator (NC) Nurse Entry to Practice (NETP) and Postgraduate (PG) funding role is divided into two major workstreams, NETP programme (0.4 FTE) and PG funding (0.6FTE). This leadership role is responsible for all aspects of coordinating and facilitating the graduate nurse programme including recruitment and retention. The NC acts as an effective role model to assist graduates in their first year of practice as a Registered Nurse. The NC works predominantly with clinical coaches, managers and nurse educators to manage issues and support graduate nurse development.

The role leads the graduate nurse programme and PG funding uptake throughout the Hutt Valley Hospital and Specialist Services, Primary and Aged and Residential Care settings. The NC is responsible and accountable for leading ongoing planning, preparation, delivery, evaluation and reporting of the graduate nurse programme and PG funding at the Hutt Valley.

The NC works in collaboration with senior nursing staff in the recruitment and selection process, in conjunction with national specifications of the programmes. The NC works closely with others within the W&PDU, the Nurse Director Workforce Development, NC NETP Cultural Support, NC NETP Capital Coast, Nurse Educator (NETP) and RN Clinical Coach/s (NETP). The role involves collaborating with Schools of Nursing and other Tertiary Education Organisations (TEOs) to ensure effective implementation of both the NETP programme and PG funding.

The NC leads the promotion, organisation and implementation of nursing postgraduate funding for Hutt Valley District. This involves educating and liaising with nurses and nursing leaders within HSS, the Primary and Community sector, providing career conversations, and implementing the District plan for providing PG funding. The NC works with the ND Workforce Development, and CCHV administrators to ensure funds are distributed according to agreed criteria and decision-making process.

The NC will respond to the District's changing needs, performing other tasks as required including contributing to projects identified by Nurse Director Workforce Development. While this is not a direct patient care role there will be some instances where clinical care is required as per organisational escalation response. The NC is expected to contribute to implementing District and nursing goals and values, while promoting Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora Capital, Coast and Hutt Valley as a centre of excellence for nursing practice.

Key Accountabilities

The following accountabilities are in addition to the Te Kaunihera Tapuhi o Aotearoa | Nursing Council of New Zealand (NCNZ) competencies for registered nurses (RN). Application onto the Professional Development and Recognition Programme (PDRP) at senior pathway is required and essential to this role.

The following role accountabilities may evolve with organisational change and there may be additional duties, relevant to this position that will be required to be performed from time to time.

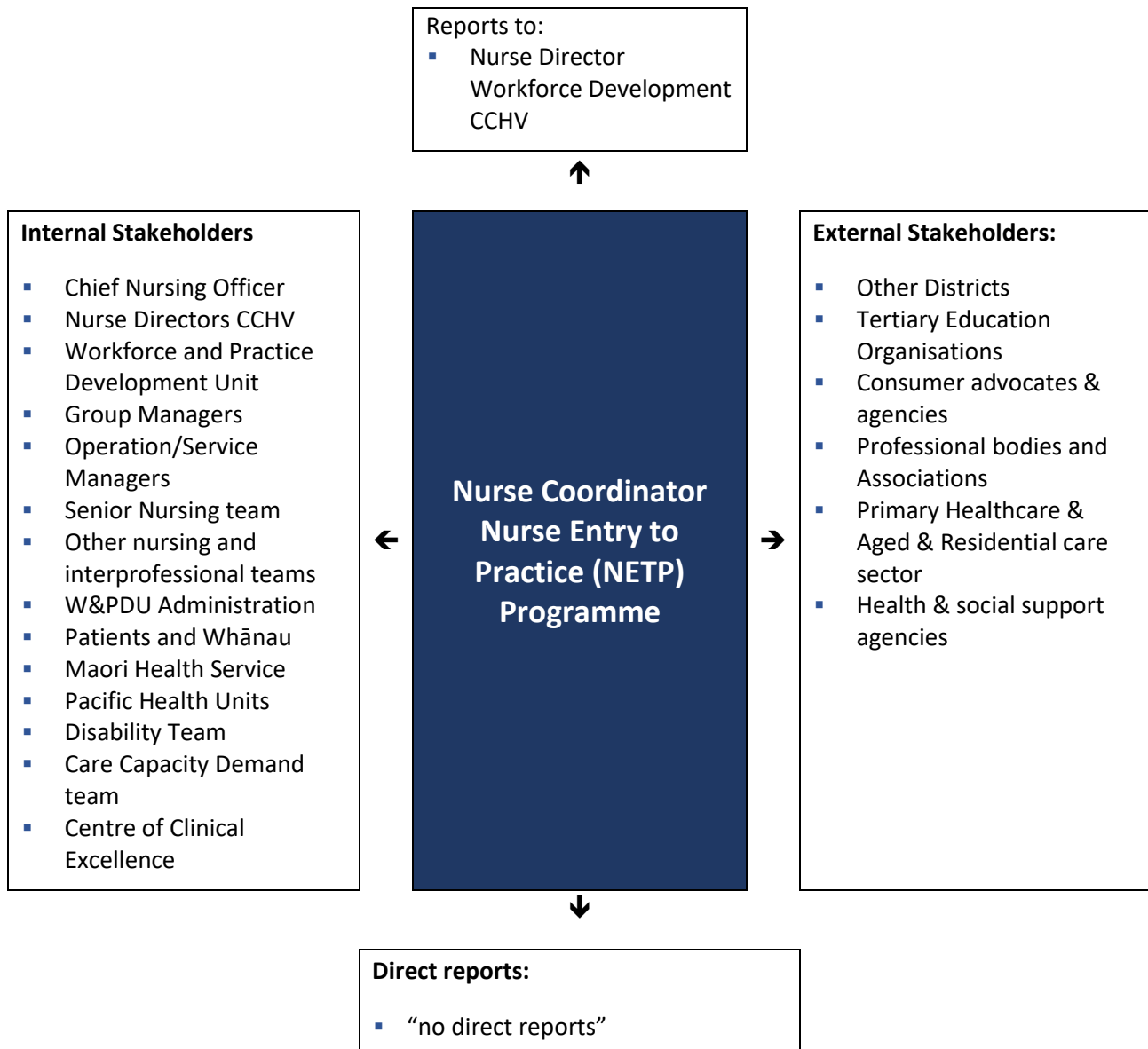
In this Position Description, the terms person or patient are used to refer to those who use health services, who in different settings may be referred to as tangata whaiora, health consumer or client.
